North Dakota Supreme Court to Decide Flared Gas Royalty Case

On December 17, 2015, the North Dakota Supreme Court heard arguments in the case of Vogel v. Marathon Oil Company, a case that addresses the ability of a mineral interest owner to pursue royalty payments for flared natural gas. The appeal in Vogel follows the state district court's order granting Marathon Oil Company's ("Marathon") motion to dismiss. The North Dakota Supreme Court's decision in Vogel should clarify which procedural mechanisms must be followed by plaintiffs seeking to obtain royalty payments for gas that is alleged to have been flared in violation of the Control of Gas and Oil Resources Act. More specifically, Vogel should clarify the role of the North Dakota Industrial Commission ("NDIC") in adjudicating claims for royalty payments under the Control of Gas and Oil Resources Act.

On November 19, 2015 the White House published its Regulatory Plan and Unified Agenda for 2016. In its Statement of Priorities, the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) identified two specific, primary priorities for 2016 related to addressing climate change and improving air quality.
